The clinical spectrum of SARS-CoV2, in most cases, presents itself as mild symptoms of gradual evolution, whose most evident manifestations are: dry cough,

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recurrent hyperthermia and respiratory discomfort, which may or may not be associated with episodes of runny nose and nasal congestion. In view of this scenario, this article aims to report the professional experience as a recent graduate in nursing care in the Covid-19 ward.

#### 2 WORK DEVELOPMENT

The motivation for exposing this peculiar experience of mine made me organize my report into three important moments: 1st Welcoming, Integration and adaptation of routine: moment prepared by the nursing management core with the purpose of integration and knowledge of work flows and processes of the nurse in their medullary and multidisciplinary activities. This step provided approximation and communication between the professional categories active in assisting Covid-19 patients. 2nd Training: newly graduated nurses are offered training in the various thematic segments of greater application and routine in the service: gowning and undressing, biosafety measures, SARS, notification forms; blood gas collection. 3rd Assuming the scale: a very challenging stage in the face of very dynamic and peculiar shifts of patients with a Covid-19 profile, but with important clinical scenarios of significant learning.

Faced with this opportunity, I was able to immeasurably develop different cognitive, psychomotor, and communication skills for the development and reach of important skills worked on in my academic and scientific training, positioning myself to develop as a more technically prepared and humanized professional to exercise with excellence, ethics and professionalism to nursing care.
